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HOW TO USE THIS DIRECTORY

Section I is a master list of animal behavior programs and researchers. This listing is alphabetical by states, followed by Puerto Rico, the Canadian Provinces, and Mexico. Full information on any department or program and all individual researchers may be found in this section. Program information includes the name of a contact person, an institution address and telephone number, and information on the types of degrees offered and current enrollment. Listings for the individual researchers begins with a section giving the name of the individual, last degree, and current title. A phone number, any FAX numbers or BITNET addresses follow with the institution where the individual received their degree. Additional information for each individual is as follows:

- a. contains the research areas each individual listed as current interests.
- b. contains a statement of research interest in the researchers own words.
- c. contains a list of animals the researcher has an active interest.

Browsing the department listings will give an indication of the focus or diversity within a an institution. The completeness of an entry is subject to information provided by the contributor.

Section II indexes individuals according to the subject area(s) of their research. Subject headings and subheadings used are adopted form those found in ANIMAL BEHAVIOR ABSTRACTS. If you are interested in researchers investigating chemical communication, you would look under the heading for COMMUNICATION and subheading CHEMICAL. Each indexed name is followed by the page number where that researcher can be found. Reference back to the listings in section I will then provide more detailed information on individuals and department.

Section III indexes individuals according to the classification of organisms studied. Because common name usage varies and is sometimes confusing, common names are not indexed. The arrangement of section III is phylogentic, adopting the terminology used in BIOLOGICAL ABSTRACTS, beginning with the phylum level in the invertebrates (e.g., classes or orders) and the class level in the vertebrates (e.g., orders or families) are arranged alphabetically. To identify all those persons studying horses, for example, one would look under the heading MAMMALIA, PERISSODACTYLA. As with section II, reference back to the given page number in the listings in section I will then provide more detailed information on individuals.

Section IV consists of an alphabetical listing of all individuals who responded to the questionnaire. Again, the page number where the researcher can be found follows the individuals names.

	all researchers working with an organism	-- use Section IV
